1. About UMAP

What is UMAP?

- •UMAP is an acronym for the "University Mobility in Asia and the Pacific".
- Initiated in 1991, it is a voluntary association of government and nongovernment representatives of the higher education (mainly university) sector.
- UMAP currently comprises 36 eligible countries / territories with over 570 participating universities/institutions.
- The general aim of UMAP is to achieve a better understanding within each of countries and territories in the Asia and pacific region of the cultural, economic and social systems of the other countries and territories in the region through enhanced cooperation among higher education institutions and increased mobility of university/institution students and staff.




1. About UMAP




1. About UMAP

Eligible countries / territories

All accredited public and private universities/institutions in following countries/territories can participate in the UMAP Exchange Programs. Other countries can also join UMAP with the approval of the governing authority of UMAP, the UMAP Board.

What we operate?

To enhance international understanding by facilitating mobility of university students and faculty members within the Asia-Pacific region.

In order to achieve its aim, UMAP is

- Operating Multilateral/Bilateral Student Exchange Programs.
- Operating the Super-Short Program and other special programs.
- Providing financial support to research relevant to the goals of UMAP.

UMAP's Study Abroad Programs

Program A&B (UMAP Multilateral / Bilateral Student Exchange Program)

UME is a student exchange program in which UMAP institutions can send and receive two students per semester. Exchanges are made on a tuition-waiver basis. Bilateral student exchange arrangements can also be made between two institutions wishing to exchange more than two students with tuition-waiver or non-waiver depending upon the host.

Program C, Super Short-Term Programs (SSTP)


SSTP are short-term (one- to eight-week) programs offered by UMAP member institutions. Programs are generally offered between July and September. It is available in a wide range of disciplines such as cultural studies, language, and entrepreneurship, depending on the host university.

UMAP Summer Program

Special summer program provided by UMAP. In 2016, the first UMAP Summer Program "UMAP Discovery Camp 2016" was held in Philippines and UMAP Summer Program 2017 held in JAPAN and UMAP Discovery Camp 2018 was held in Thailand. In 2019 Taiwan has hosted UMAP Discovery Camp 2019 organized by Department of International and Crossstrait Ministry of Education and Fu Jen Catholic University.

How we operate Program A

- UMAP IS call for participation to Pledged institutions 4 times a year.
- ◆ Participating institutions offer their program through UMAP Student Connection Online (USCO) System. Participating institutions nominate their students to other participating institutions (two persons per semester).
- ◆ If an institution accepts more than two students, the institution is able to send an equal number of excess students from the following semester (Quota system).
- Tuition fee should be waived by host institutions.
- We recommend the use of UMAP Credit Transfer Scheme (UCTS).



UMAP Student Connection Online System

USCO System has started its operation from Program A&B 2019-1 (Autumn 2019) and it has following functions;

- 1) For all Pledged Institutions*
 - Register basic information of each institution and offer their programs
 - Nominate appropriate students and follow up their application status
 - Check application status of host institutions and screen nominees
 - Select applicants with seeing their 2nd-5th preferred institutions.
- 2) For students
 - Find suitable programs for each student
 - Submit applications and other related materials
 - Trace and check application statuses.

*Pledged institutions; Universities/institutions that signed "Pledge of Agreement".

3. Merit of UMAP

Merit of Joining UMAP

- For students:
 - Students will broaden opportunity of choice to study abroad in Asia and the Pacific region.
 - Japan and Taiwan provide selected inbound students with the UMAP's scholarship.
- For institutions (Economic):
 - Annual membership fee will be charged only to the country/territory. No annual fees for each institutions.
 - Institutions can offer programs with tuition-fee (Program B and Program C).

3. Merit of UMAP-Scholarship-

<u>Japanese Government Scholarship</u> (For short-term & semester-long)

- Approx. \$700/month for international inbound students in Japan under UMAP programs.
- Approx. \$500-\$900/month for Japanese outbound students under UMAP programs.

Taiwanese Government Scholarship

(For semester-long only)

- Approx. \$700/month for international inbound students in Taiwan under UMAP programs.
- Approx. \$700/month for Taiwanese outbound students under UMAP programs.



4. About UCTS

- UCTS is an acronym for the "UMAP Credit Transfer System".
- It originally modeled ECTS, but it adopted the concept of "Asian Academic Credits" in 2013.
- UCTS is currently used for UMAP exchange programs with UMAP Study Plan form and UMAP Transcript Report.

Credit Transfer Systems" based upon the concept of Asian Academic Credits (AACs)=UCTS (UMAP Credit Transfer System) (November 1, 2018)



A Concept of UCTS (= AACs)

A proposed framework of credit system by Hotta;

One UCTS (= AACs) credit point ≒38-48 hours of student workload,

(including <u>13-16 hours of teaching (academic)</u> <u>hours)</u>

*Student workload is the total amount of hours students spend for study, (lectures, but also homework, lab, writing term papers, etc.)

5. How to participate in UMAP

General steps to be an UMAP member

- Step-1: Establish National Secretariat (NS)
 - NS represents the country/territory and is responsible for the promotion and development of Exchange Programs. NS should be a governmental institution of higher education (i.e. ministry of education), however, a particular university may serve as UMAP NS.
- Step-2: Contact National Secretariat

Each university/institution need to contact NS and to request an endorsement for joining UMAP. NS is required to check the institution whether it is accredited one or not and inform UMAP IS of the result.

Step-3: Contract "Pledge of Agreement"

It is required for new members to sign the "Pledge of Agreement" in order to participate in UMAP Programs. Please contact UMAP IS by sending an email to (umap-is@umap.org). The contents of the agreement is shown in the website below;



Number of Participating Institutions* (2011-2019)






Number of Exchange Students (2011-2019)




Number of Exchange Students (2012-2019)
